

31 March 2024: Easter Day

Mark's musings



Mary Magdalene's world collapsed when Jesus took his last breath on the cross. We read: "Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." (John 20:1–2). Mary must

have been reeling as she made her way to the tomb that Sunday morning. She had suffered with Jesus through his painful death, the helpless agony of one who can only watch and wait for the suffering of a loved one to end. Jesus' death, when his life was finally *'finished'*, must have come as a relief, followed by the deeper pain of the finality of his absence.

A young doctor said to me once, after watching her father, also a medico suffer greatly before he died, that she had come to believe her father's suffering, as excruciating as it was for him to bear, had served a purpose. It made her father ready to leave this world with all its pains and sorrows and it helped her family to let him go, knowing he would have no more pain.

Many of us know this to be true from painful experience. Still we let our loved ones go reluctantly, fearing they are lost to us forever, wondering how we can possibly live without them. Our hearts ache for years. We are tempted to despair. We feel sorry for ourselves, we are angry with our loved ones for leaving, even angry at God for taking them and angry with everyone else for going on with their lives as if nothing has happened.

'It's not fair!'' we want to scream. This is not what we signed up for. When we gave birth to our little ones we thought we could protect them, from everything! When we said, *"till death do us part,"* we thought it would never happen.

When my mum died at age 79 in December 2012, she was so sick and in so much pain that we gave thanks for her release. But the pain of her absence is no less than if she had died at a young age. Death wounds us deeply - and frightens us like nothing else. We all walk the hard path Mary walked as she made her way to the tomb, "...on the first day of the week while it was still dark" (20:1).

I invite you to experience the power of resurrection as we celebrate the Easter story once again. It begins in darkness and ends, well you know how it ends. The journey will take you where you have never been before and it is truly life-giving.

Jean B in the news

Local *Star Weekly* (20/3) on page 6 includes a story (by journalist Cade Lucas) about Werribee UC member Jean B, with a lovely photo of her displaying the Victorian Volunteering Award.

Cade's story "Jean volunteers decade of her time" sums up a life of 88 years, including more than 70 years volunteering.



Recently invited to Government House to receive the award, Jean (pictured) says that she will continue to help others "I'll keep on going as long as I'm able."

According to Star Weekly, "Jean's lifetime of helping others, ranging from hospital visits and home care, to Lifeline, St John's Ambulance and radio for the print handicapped was last month

recognised at the Victorian volunteering Awards where she took out the volunteer impact category."

For many years Jean was a faithful member of Trinity Uniting congregation, in Seves St Altona. Her professional life as a nurse included "Gwennap" the Uniting Church aged care facility in Geelong Road Footscray.

Jean continued volunteering during her nursing career and also while raising her four children and then caring for her late husband John prior to his death from a long illness in 2006.

"Absolutely honoured," she said of how it felt to received the award at Government House. "I love what I do so it gives me a feeling of satisfaction that I'm doing something with meaning and purpose."

Nowadays she writes bereavement cards to family and friends of those who died in palliative care, a less active role than she's had in the past. Jean says age isn't a barrier to volunteering. "You're never too old to help another person." (Story by Neil T)
