# Victorian treaty introduction



On 9 September, in the Uniting Church's Facebook page, the Moderator, the Rev. Salesi Faupula welcomed the introduction

of legislation to the Victorian Parliament to establish a Treaty between the State Government and Victoria's First Peoples.

Salesi said a Treaty represented long overdue recognition of the right of Victoria's First Peoples to self-determination and begins to address the enduring harm of colonisation, dispossession and injustice as experienced by First Peoples. He said a speech by First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria member, Aunty Esme Bamblett, at the very recent Synod meeting had offered a powerful reminder of why a Treaty mattered so much to indigenous Victorians.

"As the Synod continues the journey of walking together with First Peoples, we acknowledge the importance of a Treaty within Victoria as part of that journey," Salesi said. "Treaty, though, is only the first step in acknowledging the historical and ongoing injustices suffered by Victoria's First Peoples as a result of colonisation. As such, at its recent meeting the Synod once again affirmed its commitment to walking together as First and Second Peoples, and to working cooperatively towards a more just future for First Peoples."
