Node Madu



Node is the third child in a family of seven from the Kunini Village in the Western Province of Papua New Guinea. His father was a Pastor, Rev Kibani Were Madu with the United Church of Papua New

Guinea (PNG) and later became a local language Translator with the Summer Institute of Linguistics (SIL). He was encouraged to join their linguistic work and spent 6 months in Los Angeles, USA to proof read and edit. That led on to translation and publication of the whole of the New Testament into the local language, BINE. The New Testament Bine Bible is called IRELOTA MENE (Life Giving Words). Later Node worked with his dad to translate a Hymn Book and a Bible Study Guide into the Bine language.

Node's siblings have all gone on to important roles including a Geologist, a Lawyer, a Land Administrator, and one sister is in Ministry in PNG.

Node's education began at a village primary school in PNG and he attended boarding school for his secondary school years before he studied dental science at the University of PNG (UPNG). In 1985 he received a scholarship from the Australian Government to study at the Royal Adelaide Dental School. That qualified him to become a Teaching Fellow and Tutor at the Faculty of Medicine, UPNG.

Node married Leiah Misima in 1987. In 1988 Node was awarded a second scholarship to study at Melbourne University for 5 years. He did specialised training in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery (OMFS) Node's specialist skills were in great demand. He worked in seven hospitals including Royal Melbourne and Royal Children's.

In 2025 Node received an award for 25 years of service in the Austin Hospital. (Photo above)

Node worked in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery and his late wife Leiah was a staff Dental Nurse at Royal Dental Hospital. They have four adult children. Their eldest daughter Victoria was born in 1992 and works as a nurse in Cairns. Son Poweji (PJ) is a carpenter in Wonthaggi.

Their twins Joshua (Assistant Manager in a chocolate packing warehouse) and Rachel were born in 2001. Rachel is a Assistant Hotel Manager in Geelong and Melbourne. Her fiancé comes from Chile. When Node completed his training and experience in Melbourne he returned to Port Moresby to work only to be told *"We don't have a job for you."* However, God was in control and before long Node had three jobs and more than enough to do.

His roles included health administrator, specialist clinician and teaching. AusAID has involved Node as a consultant to help develop the National Health Plan for PNG. Working with charities to support PNGeans to have specialist medical services in Australia. Node has escorted PNG patients who needed to travel to Australia for procedures that could not be done in PNG. In recognition of his leadership in the health profession he was awarded Fellowship of International College of Dental Surgeons (FICDS) of USA. Above all serving God as Chairman of his Provincial Fellowship was always a priority.

In recent years Node was back in Melbourne, he lost his wife during the Covid pandemic.

Living alone, and their children, all adults now moving on with their lives. He decided to re-marry and established contact with Mae Joy through Christian Filipina. Her family were very protective and not sure about allowing her to move away. Node made several trips to the Philippines to convince them that he would be a suitable husband. Finally the family agreed to the marriage and Node and Mae Joy were married on 31st August, 2024 in the Philippines before Mae Joy came to live with Node in Melbourne.
